The Te Deum is an early Christian hymn in Latin which is a standard part of Matins (Morning Prayer) in the 1662 Book of Common Prayer.

The first four lines (*Te Deum laudamus: te Dominum confitemur. Te eternum Patrem omnis terra veneratur.*) are in the swirly scrolls by Christ's head. The rest of the window uses snippets from all over the text of the Te Deum.

Around Christ are the four gospel-writers with their symbolic animals.

To the left are female saints (Mary Magdalene, Agnes, the Virgin Mary) worshipping (*Tu Rex gloriae, Christe.*)

To the right are prophets John the Baptist, Moses and Elijah (*Te Prophetarum laudabilis numerus*)

Then in the third row (left to right) are Apostles (*Te gloriosus Apostolorum chorus*) (Paul has the sword of the Spirit, Peter the keys of the kingdom, and Andrew the X-shaped cross)

Then Teachers of the Church Augustine, Gregory, Ambrose, and Jerome (*Te...* sancta confitetur Ecclesia).

Then Martyrs Alban, William of Norwich, and Lawrence, holding palm branches (*Te Martyrum candidatus ... exercitus.*)

In the bottom row (left to right) is the line (*Tu ad dexteram Dei sedes, in gloria Patris. Iudex crederis esse venturus*) with Kings Charles, Louis IX, and Edmund; Monks Benedict, Francis, and Dominic; and Female Saints Catherine (with her Catherine wheel), Etheldreda, and Margaret de Valois.
